Recession Proof Your Future

The news is full of information about job losses, recession and budget cuts. In 2010, Weber County 4-H will offer a number of workshops, scholarships, and activities to help teens take steps for a financially secure future.

Demonstration Workshop: *Tuesday, February 9, 6:30 p.m., Extension office, FREE, registration deadline February 2.* Speaking in front of an audience is a skill you will be called to do over and over! In this workshop, youth and adults will learn how to prepare a successful 4-H demonstration—just in time to excel in the 4-H Demonstration Contest.

Resume Workshop: *Monday, March 8, 4 p.m., Extension office, FREE, registration deadline March 1.* Within the world of 4-H, you will need a resume for State Ambassador applications, scholarships, ambassador fair entries, job applications and more. Often teens are unsure how to prepare a resume, especially if they do not have a job. Learn how to showcase your skills, including leadership and volunteer experience on a resume.

Interview Workshop: *Monday, March 15, 4 p.m., Extension office, FREE, registration deadline March 8.* You will go through interviews all of your life! In 4-H, we utilize interviews for scholarships, ambassadors, aggie camp counselors, national trip delegates, internships and more. Learn how to ace an interview!

Portfolio Workshops: Portfolios are used to select scholarship winners, ambassadors, and national trip delegates. A well-done portfolio could potentially earn you thousands of dollars. Learn how to prepare an award-winning 4-H portfolio by attending a portfolio workshop. Classes will be offered three times in 2010:

- *Tuesday, April 13, 6:00 p.m., Extension office, FREE, registration deadline April 6*
- *Tuesday, June 8, 6:00 p.m., Extension office, FREE, registration deadline June 1*
- *Tuesday, September 8, 6:00 p.m., Extension office, FREE, registration deadline August 31*



Scholarships:

How much is higher education worth in cold hard money?

The report

titled "The Big Payoff: Educational Attainment and Synthetic Estimates of Work-Life Earnings" reveals that over an adult's working life, **high school graduates can expect, on average, to earn nearly \$1 million dollars less than a college graduate.** Needless to say obtaining a college education is very important to your financial future; scholarships can help make college an affordable reality.

Earn A 4-H Scholarship

Every day on the news you hear about the importance of higher education, especially in today's tight job market. The other part of the story is that organizations, such as 4-H, offer thousands of dollars in scholarships to their active participants. Often youth have a much better chance of being selected for an organization's scholarship versus an academic scholarship.

Most scholarship applications will be due in early February and March. Rather than waiting until spring, begin right now seeking out and applying for 4-H, commodity and other organization's scholarships. Begin requesting reference letters now. Most scholarships require a short essay as part of the scholarship. If you wait until the last minute, the essay you write will reflect minimal efforts—drastically reducing your chances of receiving a scholarship.

4-H offers a number of scholarships at the county and state level. Active 4-H members who are graduating seniors are eligible to apply.

STATE: The state offers approximately ten different scholarships. Youth may apply for any scholarship for which they are eligible, using the same application form. To apply for a state 4-H scholarship, go to www.utah4-H.org and download the form. The scholarship application, up-to-date portfolio, high school transcript, and two letters of recommendation are due to the county 4-H office by **February 1st**.

COUNTY: There are two Weber County 4-H scholarships. Youth can apply for either or both of these scholarships. Graduating seniors active in any project area are eligible to apply. The scholarship application, essays, portfolio, tran-

script, and two letters of recommendation are due to the county 4-H office by **February 1st**. Following a review of the applications, scholarship interviews will be held by appointment in March. The two county 4-H scholarships are:

- **Commitment to Agriculture Foundation** – Scholarship amount varies; scholarship can be used at any higher education institution, including technical schools.
 - Essay Question 1. What skills have 4-H provided you with which will help you achieve your personal and professional goals 10 years from now?
 - Essay Questions 2. What can you do as an adult in your community to continue to support 4-H and other youth leadership organizations?
- **Weber County 4-H Scholarship** – \$500; scholarship must be used at Utah State University.
 - Essay Question 1: What has been your most meaningful 4-H project or 4-H activity? Consider the following in your essay:
 - Years involved in the project.
 - Why you originally chose it, and what you hoped to learn from it.
 - The skills and types of knowledge you gained from working on it.
 - How has your involvement in the project or activity influenced you, your educational choices, and/or your career choices?
 - Essay Question 2: In 4-H, we “pledge our hands to larger service.” What does this mean to you and what have you learned through your involvement in 4-H community service?

The selection criteria and applications are available on the county website at www.webercounty4-H.org or from the 4-H office. The county and state 4-H programs will award thousands of scholarship dollars to 4-H youth. You could be the beneficiary of the 4-H scholarship program!

In addition to 4-H scholarships, many commodity organizations also offer scholarships to youth who have been active in the programs they offer. Following are some additional scholarship opportunities of which we are aware; it is always a good idea to contact commodity organizations in which you are active for other possibilities.

- **Utah Cattlewomen's Association Scholarship** – For graduating seniors; due March 31. \$500; choice of college or university. Application packet includes application, two letters of recommendations, 550 word essay, and high school transcript. For more information, visit www.utahcattlemen.org or contact Leslie Yardley at utahcattlewoman@hotmail.com.
- **Utah Registered Sheep Breeder's Association Scholarship** – For graduating seniors; due March 1. \$500 up to a 1,000 scholarship. Application packet includes application, resume, three letters of recommendations, 500 word essay explaining interest, ideas and involvement in the pure-bred sheep industry, and high school transcript. New Year's Resolution - Be a Gold Level 4-H Club

At 4-H Achievement Night we had an opportunity to honor ten clubs who earned a Bronze, Silver or Gold club award. EVERY club that meets the standards is honored, so start your year off right and plan to be a 4-H medal winning club in 2010. Following are the guidelines for each level:

Bronze Club Award Criteria:

- Five or more officially enrolled members
- One or more officially registered and trained club leaders
- Two or more projects conducted by the club
- Club meets at least once a month for six or more months of the year
- Elected, rotating, or appointed youth officers

Silver Club Award Criteria:

- Five or more officially enrolled members

- One or more officially registered and trained club leaders
- Two or more projects conducted by the club
- Club meets at least once a month for six or more months of the year
- Elected, rotating, or appointed youth officers
- Club conducts two or more community service projects
- 50 % of members enter the fair
- Club conducts end of the year recognition program for its members

Gold Club Award Criteria:

- Five or more officially enrolled members
- One or more officially registered and trained club leaders
- Two or more projects conducted by the club
- Club meets at least once a month for six or more months of the year

- Elected, rotating, or appointed youth officers
- Club conducts two or more community service projects
- 50% of members enter the fair
- Club conducts end of the year recognition program for its members
- 50% of members participate in club demonstrations/speeches
- 50% of members submit portfolios in county competition (excluding cloverbud members)



Big Changes for SOME 4-H Contests

To help our families better manage their busy schedules, we are going to try a new format for some of our 4-H contests.

Utah County has utilized the following schedule and we are going to try it for this year. We'll evaluate the new schedule at the end of the year to see if our county will permanently adopt this format.

ONLY the following seven contests will be impacted by this change:

1. **4-H Public Speaking Contest:** Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual only. Youth research, write and present an original speech. The speech should relate directly to the participant's 4-H experience. Youth are not allowed to use visual aids for their speech.
2. **Horse Public Speaking Contest:** Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual only. Youth research, write, and present an original speech on a topic appropriate to the horse industry. Youth may not use visual aids for their speech.
3. **Impromptu Public Speaking Contest:** Eligibility: Grades 6-12. Individual only. Contestants will give a speech on a randomly assigned topic.
4. **Demonstration Contest (all categories, including horse):** Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual or team of two. Youth research, write and present a demonstration. Members use posters and visual aids to "show" the steps.
5. **Talent Contest:** Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual or a team of two, three or four members. Youth share a talent performance in the discipline of their choice such as vocal, drama, dance, gymnastics, instrumental, comedy, etc. A maximum of five minutes is allowed for the talent performance. An electric keyboard piano and CD player will be provided – all other equipment must be provided by member.
6. **Fashion Consumer Strategies Con-**

test: Eligibility: Grades 6-12. Individual only. Youth select an outfit, model the outfit for a panel of judges, and share decisions made in selecting the outfit. The member will consider three outfits when making their selection and demonstrate decision making skills in selecting the most suitable of the three.

7. **World of Work:** Eligibility: Grades 9-12. Individual only. Youth prepare a resume, complete an application, and participate in an interview to evaluate their job readiness and interview skills.

Rather than having a specific day scheduled for each contest listed above, we are going to offer several different days. 4-H Contest Days will be from 2 – 5:30 p.m. at the 4-H office on the following days:

- ✓ February 17
- ✓ March 17
- ✓ April 21
- ✓ May 19
- ✓ June 16

You will note that all of these dates are on Wednesday's, an early release day for elementary students. Contestants **MUST** sign up for the contest with the 4-H office at least one week prior to the contest date to participate. Appointments will be scheduled in 15-minute increments; contestants need to arrive early enough to begin their presentation at the assigned time.

There are several advantages to this new format:

- Families won't have to totally miss a 4-H contest if they have a major date conflict; rather they can schedule their appointment for a different 4-H Contest Day.
- Because only one child will be competing at a time, parents won't miss one of their children competing in an adjacent room.
- Youth can compete in both public

speaking and demonstrations since these events can be scheduled for different days and/or times.

- 4-H staff will get to see all demos and speeches and can help senior youth polish their demos and speeches in preparation for state competition.
- Families will not have to wait until everyone competes and can leave as soon as they compete.

One big **potential problem** with this format is that everyone will wait until the last minute to get their demonstration or speech ready and then expect to compete in June. Obviously, that can't happen. Only 14 youth can compete on each contest day. **KNOW IN ADVANCE**, these are the **ONLY** contest dates that will be offered. Select a date and time that works well for your family and make an appointment. Appointments will be scheduled on a first-registered basis. Please remember to be considerate and follow through with all appointments and arrive early enough to compete at your designated time; your judge will be ready and waiting.

For all contests:

- All contestants must be currently enrolled 4-H members (i.e., must have re-enrolled in 4-H since October 1, 2009).
- Every participant will receive a blue, red or white rosette ribbon, Clover Bucks for blue or red rating, and certificate.
- Senior 4-H'ers who receive a blue rating earn the opportunity to compete in state competition in July.
- All contests require pre-registration at least one week prior to the contest.

The following contests **WILL NOT** be affected by the new format; youth must register by the deadline listed, provide any forms indicated at the time of registration, and compete on the date listed.

County 4-H Contests continued...

Healthy Cuisine Contest: January 21.

Location: TBA. Eligibility: Grades 3-12.

MUST register by January 15. Individual or a team of two. Youth plan a nutritionally balanced meal, purchase the supplies, prepare, and serve a dinner for two judges, and clean up within a one hour time limit.

- For beginning 4-Hers and those that have not participated in this contest before it is highly recommended that participants work as a team of two.
- Due to limited cooking facilities, time slots will be staggered with starting times at 4:00 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Sign up early to get the time that works best for you!
- Registration forms will be due at sign up (January 15). If all slots are filled, an extra contest date will be added on January 28.
- Contest details and scoring card can be found on www.webercounty4-H.org under the Healthy Cuisine contest.
- Youth that anticipate entering in the advanced Chef Extraordinaire contest (instead of Healthy Cuisine) *please contact Naomi at (801) 399-8206.*

January – Chef Extraordinaire Contest:

Eligibility: Grades 6-12. Individual or team of two. Youth plan a nutritionally balanced meal, purchase the supplies, prepare, and serve a dinner for four guests (chosen by the contestant) and a judge, and clean up within a three hour time limit.

March – Fashion Revue Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual only. Youth sew a garment and model it for the judges. Judging includes clothing construction, modeling, fit, confidence, and poise; and how well they respond in an interview process. All participants model their garments for the audience during the culminating 4-H Fashion Revue.

April – Dairy Judging Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual. Youth learn to judge a class of dairy cows and give oral reasons for their placement.

April – Livestock Bowl Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual. Youth compete in a quiz bowl with livestock-related (beef, swine, and sheep) questions.

May – Horse Bowl Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual. Youth compete in a quiz bowl with horse-related questions.

May – Life Skill Bowl Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual only. Youth will

compete in a quiz bowl contest answering questions related to the Consumer & Family Science curriculum area, including foods and nutrition, financial management, clothing and textiles, consumer decision making, and child care.

June – Horse Judging Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual. Youth learn to judge a class of horses and give oral reasons for their placement.

June – Livestock Judging Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual. Youth learn to judge livestock (sheep, swine, and beef) and give oral reasons for their placement.

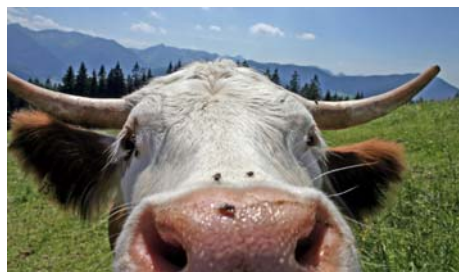
June – Robotics Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual or teams of two. Participants build and program a robot using Lego MindStorm[®] kits to achieve the assigned challenges within the time limit. Laptops, software and robotics kits provided.



2010 Winter Livestock Discovery Nights

The time to start preparing for the fair is now. Come learn more about your project animal and you will be able to ace those livestock tests and showmanship questions!

Youth, parents, and leaders interested in learning about livestock are invited to



attend 4-H Livestock Discovery Nights. Call the 4-H office at (801)399-8202 prior to attending to ensure event has not been cancelled due to weather.

Workshops will be held every other Wednesday night, January through March, at 6:00 p.m. at the 4-H office. The dates and topics for 2010 will be:

- January 6 - Facilities and equipment: what do you need?
- January 20 - Showmanship questions: correct terminology, parts, and yields.
- February 3 - Selection: identifying a sound, quality show animal.

- February 17 - The basics of livestock judging: what is the judge looking for?
- March 3 - Feed and nutrition: what to feed, when to feed and how to feed your animal; getting to goal weight, calculating average daily gain and feed efficiency.
- March 17 - Health management: preventing, identifying and treating common diseases.
- March 31 - Daily care: hair care, exercise, and showmanship practice.
- April 14 - 4-H Livestock Quiz Bowl Contest - ALL 4-H members (grades 3-12) are invited to compete!

4-H Livestock Test Program: 2010 Schedule

We are seeing a tremendous increase in the number of participants in the monthly livestock testing program. You are invited to join in the fun. Any 4-H member in 3rd - 12th grade is invited to participate in our annual livestock testing contest. Participating is EASY:

1. Purchase the resource manual for

your species (beef, sheep, swine, or goat) from the 4-H office.

2. Study the chapter for the month.
3. Come to the 4-H office (8 a.m.-4:30 p.m., M-F) when it fits your schedule (any time from the 15th through the end of the month) and take the test.
4. EARN PRIZES!

The tests are a combination of true/false, multiple choice, and fill in the blank questions; it will take about 15 minutes to complete a test. There are different tests for each grade division and for each species. The chapters for January are:
